THE CARNAHAN LIBRARY

Dedicated on 11/1/09 to the memory of Thomas Dorrington Carnahan II, Thomas Dorrington Carnahan III, George Kirk Carnahan and to the glory of God.

The following books were donated to the library. The Library Committee thanks the donors. All have been cataloged and are ready to be checked out. The library is in Room 308, the first room on the right as you enter the third floor hallway from the elevator. The card catalog will help you to locate a book by author, title or subject.

State of Terror by Hillary Rodham Clinton and Louise Penny. This fictional story centers around a modern day Secretary of State when three terrorist bombings take place in different cities in Europe. She organizes a team of trusted associates to help her find out what happened and what will happen next. The plot holds the reader's interest throughout. (The library has other books by Louise Penny.)

The Maid by Nita Prose. The main character, Molly Gray, is a maid at an exclusive New York hotel. She takes great pride in her work and has gained the reputation of being one of the top maids. She is young, trusting and sometimes gullible. One day, a wealthy American is found dead in his bed by Molly. She reports it but through a series of events by some questionable characters, she becomes a suspect.

The Forest of Vanishing Stars by Kristin Harmel. The story begins in 1922 when the main character, Jerusza, kidnaps the 2-year old daughter of a German officer and his wife. Jerusza is now 82 and she has lived her life in the unforgiving wilderness of eastern Europe. She has amassed a lifetime of survival skills such as finding food in the harshest winters, how to build a shelter to withstand the elements and even how to kill a man if she must. She has lived alone until she takes the little girl. They eventually rescue and help Jewish families during WWII.

(The library has another book by this author entitled The Book of Lost Names.)

Cemetery Road by Greg Iles. The main character is Marshall McEwan, a successful journalist in Washington, DC. When his father from Bienville, MS becomes terminally ill, he returns to help run his dad's newspaper. He finds a lot of corruption in the town caused by a group of local wealthy men. Marshall tries to solve the murder of one of his longtime older friends which then puts his life at risk.

The Lincoln Highway by Amor Towles. In June, 1954 the main character, 18-year old Emmett Watson returns home from a 15 month sentence at a work farm for involuntary manslaughter. He and his 8-year old brother, Billy, decide to go to CA to find their mother who left the family years before. Through a series of circumstances, two escaped friends from the same work farm join them but instead of going to CA directly, they go to NYC to get cash for the trip. The book just spans 10 days but covers a lot of adventures.

Daughter of the Morning Star by Craig Johnson. This is the 17th book in the well known Longmire series. Walt Longmire is a county sheriff in WY. His best friend is an Indian named Henry Standing Bear. This story is connected to the Chevenne Indian Reservation and a high school girl named Jaya Long who is an excellent basketball player. Some of the plot is connected to the beliefs of the Indians.

Into the Forest by Rebecca Frankel. This WWII non-fiction book follows the Rabinowitz family that narrowly escaped the Nazi ghetto in their Polish town by fleeing to a nearby forest. They survived two years in the woods until they were liberated by the Red Army in 1944. Eventually they immigrated to the U.S.

Chasing History: A Kid in the Newsroom by Carl Bernstein. At age 16, this now famous writer landed a job as a copyboy at the Evening Star, the afternoon paper in Washington, DC. He went on to become part of the team Woodward and Bernstein who broke the news of the Watergate scandal during the Nixon Administration. This is his memoir.

The Girl from the Channel Islands by Jenny Lecoat. The main character is a young Jewish woman who lives on one of the Channel Islands. Hedy ends up hiding in plain sight, working as a translator for the Germans while silently working against them. In time she realizes that she's in greater danger but she manages to find a friend or two among the enemy.

Ordinary Heroes: A Memoir of 9/11 by Joseph Pfeifer. This FDNY chief was one of the first firemen to arrive at the World Trade Center. He was responsible for sending the men into the burning towers including his younger brother. It's the story of an ordinary man who along with other ordinary people answered the call that fateful day and on the difficult days that followed.

The following gently used book was donated anonymously.

Body of Lies by David Ignatius. This fictional story is based on the author's actual experiences covering the Middle East and the CIA for over 25 years. He is now a prize winning columnist for the Washington Post. The main character is a CIA operative named Roger Ferris whose next mission is to penetrate the network of a master spy known only as "Suleiman." His plan is inspired by a masterpiece of British intelligence during WWII. He prepares a body of lies, literally the corpse of an imaginary CIA officer who appears to have accomplished the impossible by recruiting an agent within the enemy's ranks. There are many twists and turns and the characters are interesting.



The Believer's Identity in Christ In the gospel of John, Jesus contrasts His purpose with that of humanity's adversary when He states, 10 "The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly." John 10:10(ESV). Our adversary is not creative, but he is consistent, incessantly whispering lies to us about God and ourselves that take root in our minds and distort our perception of reality stealing, killing, and destroying all that is good in us and for us. For followers of Jesus, the realization of the abundant life Jesus promises here and now is foundationally rooted in becoming increasingly aware of the specific lies that masquerade as truth and replacing them with the truths of who God really is and who we are as uniquely created in His image. In this class you will learn how to identify the lies that the enemy uses to keep you held captive, destroy them, and replace them with the biblical truths that will set you free (John 8:32) to know life as Jesus intends for you

Bio: If you were to ask those closest to Dr. Mark Simpson what makes him tick, they would say that his heart beats to inspire a legacy of knowing and imitating Christ. Whether it is in his marriage to Holly (29 years), his fathering of Mackenzie (22) and Ethan (16) or in his pastoral ministry (30+ years), this is the common thread that gets him up in the morning and keeps him talking late into the night.
