So, we celebrate with Steve Devenney, who was appointed the new Chief of the Washington Police department. He was sworn in on January 2, 2024. Steve, we feel safe in your hands, at church and at home.

GRANT AWARDED TO HANDS AND HEARTS

WOMEN, (Women Organized to Mentor, Empower and Network), of Southwestern Pennsylvania, Inc., awarded grants to 35 local non-profit organizations. The guidelines for these grants state the money is to be used only for women and children in need. One of the organizations recognized with a grant was The Church of the Covenant's Hands and Hearts group.

With the grant money, Hands and Hearts (H & H) provided help for local people in need. They funded scholarships for three kids to go to Pine Springs Camp, supplied new underwear for 12 children for the start of the school year and gave brand-new, warm winter pajamas for a family's six children, as well as buying supplies for ongoing women/children programs.

Hands and Hearts' continuing projects include "Love In a Basket," a ministry that provides items for new babies and their mothers, distributing Prayer Shawls (made by Knitting/Sewing Angels), and Teddy Bears and puzzle books to hospitalized or homebound church members. H & H gave gift bags for the church's homebound members for Easter and Christmas, stocked the Commons rack with Care Notes, which are pamphlets that can help us cope with grief or other life events, and coordinated the Blue Christmas service in December.

Hands and Hearts purchases greeting cards as group members receive coupons or find sales. In the past year, the Card Ministry sent greeting cards, each one personalized with a note and an appropriate Bible verse, to over 450 church and community members.

Hands and Hearts also provides educational programs, including CPR, Elder Law and Diabetes Education, offered by professionals in those fields.

Church members who have temporary need for medical equipment like walkers or wheelchairs can benefit from the Hands and Hearts loan-out program, through the Parish Nurse.

Hands and Hearts members are Mary Wichterman, Linda Grimm, Pat Boyer, Gay Lynn Miller and Sarah Losko. If any of the activities of Hands and Hearts sounds like something you would like to help with, they welcome new members.

COMMUNITY CIRCLE FOOD PANTRY

In the Commons is a tub for items to be donated to the Community Circle Food Pantry. The most needed items change monthly due to the availability of what the Greater Pittsburgh food bank has delivered. Peanut Butter is one of the most requested items. The generic list would also include Jelly, Mac'n cheese, Corn, Green Beans, Spaghetti Sauce and Spaghetti Noodles.

There has been an increase in families coming to the pantry, with a lot of them utilizing us now on a weekly basis to meet their food insecurities.

Community Circle Food Pantry is open every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday 9 a.m. till noon and is located at 70 E. Beau Street, Washington, with the entrance in the alley behind the First Methodist Church.
