To paraphrase C.S. Lewis' famous statement, "All the wars and all the plagues in history have never increased the death toll an iota--- it has always been, and always will be, one per person." One death per person. Well, we don't want to think about our own mortality, and we do many things to pretend that it's not approaching. We dye our graying hair. We cover our age spots with makeup. We get cosmetic surgery to preserve the image of youth. Rarely do we seriously think about our own death. But despite our death-denying tendencies life is rushing on.

Therefore, as we approach Easter we should take time to remind ourselves of the Bible's teaching about death, suffering, and its aftermath. On the one hand, Psalm 90:12 tells us to "number our days aright, that we may get a heart of wisdom." We are not being asked to literally discern the exact number of our days, of course, but to recognize that we have a finite number of them. Psalm 139:16 says of God beholding the baby as it develops inside its mother: "Your eyes saw my unformed body. All the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be."

But God, in his mercy, has turned even the inevitability and terror of death into one of his mercies. Job's friend Elihu, (The one who isn't rebuked for giving bad counsel) suggests that God uses the pains of approaching death to "terrify them with warnings, to turn man away from wrongdoing and keep him from pride, to preserve his soul from the pit." Elihu goes on to say, however, that these "scare'em into the Kingdom" tactics would be useless unless there is an angel on his side as a mediator, one out of a thousand,...to say "Spare him from going down to the pit; I have found a ransom for him!" (v.23).

Jesus IS our mediator, our ransom, the one who saves us from going down into the pit. We can therefore face death and suffering knowing that He is by our side, that in fact He has been there before us and leads us through to the resurrection. We can battle pain, suffering, and disease because Jesus did so first and told us to follow and imitate Him. "Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?" It is gone, swallowed up in life so that we may have confidence whether our lives be long or short, easy or painful, He will be with us and bring us through.

Rejoicing with you in Christ's victory over death,

# **THE CARNAHAN LIBRARY**

Dedicated on 11/1/09 to the memory of Thomas Dorrington Carnahan II, Thomas Dorrington Carnahan III, George Kirk Carnahan and to the glory of God.

The Carnahan Library is in Room 308, the first room on the right as you enter the third-floor hallway from the elevator. The card catalog will help you to locate a book by author, title, or subject. The Library Committee thanks the donors of the Library books.

\*Resurrection Walk\* (A Lincoln Lawyer Novel) by Michael Connelly was purchased with library funds. Defense Attorney Mickey Haller takes the long-shot cases where the chances of winning are one in a million. He asks his half-brother, retired LAPD detective Harry Bosch, to weed through letters from incarcerated people claiming innocence, knowing that most claims will be false. Bosch pulls a needle from the haystack: a woman in prison for five years for killing her husband, a sheriff's deputy, though all along, she has maintained that she didn't do it. Bosch reviews the case and sees elements that don't add up. Haller has an uphill battle in court, a David fighting Goliath scenario, to vindicate his client. The path for both lawyer and investigator is fraught with danger from those who don't want the case reopened and will stop at nothing to keep the Haller-Bosch team from finding the truth. (There are other books by Michael Connelly in the Library.)

The Book of Charlie by David Von Drehle was donated by Linda **Pitner** and is the inspiring story of a 109-year-old man's journey through a century of upheaval. When a veteran Washington journalist, David Von Drehle, moved to the Midwest, he met a new neighbor who was more than a century old, Charlie White. Little did he know that he was beginning a long friendship and a profound lesson in the meaning of life. Charlie White was no ordinary neighbor. When a shocking tragedy interrupted his idyllic childhood, Charlie mastered survival strategies that reflected thousands of years of human wisdom. Thus armored, Charlie's sense of adventure carried him on an epic journey across the continent, from swinging to Jazz Age bands, racing aboard ambulances through gangster wars, improvising techniques for early open-heart surgery, and cruising the Amazon as a guest of Peru's president. Charlie's resilience and willingness to grow made him a master in thriving through times of dramatic change. As a gift to his children, David Von Drehle set out to tell Charlie's secrets in this book.

#### The following three books were donated by Barb Knight.

The Secret (A Jack Reacher Novel) by Lee Child and Andrew Child. In 1992, all across the United States respectable, upstanding citizens are showing up dead. These deaths could be accidents, and they don't appear to be connected until a fatal fall from a high-floor window attracts some unexpected attention from the Secretary of Defense. All of a sudden, he wants an interagency task force to investigate; and he wants Jack Reacher as the Army's representative. If Reacher gets a result, great. If not, he's a convenient fall guy. Office politics aren't Reacher's strong point. Three questions quickly emerge: who's with him, who's against him, and will the justice he dispenses be the official kind...or his own kind? (The Library has other books by Lee Child.) Death Without Company by Craig Johnson is from the Netflix original series *Longmire*. When Mari Baroja is found poisoned at the Durant Home for Assisted Living, Sheriff Walter Longmire is drawn into the investigation that reaches back fifty years into the mysterious woman's past. Her connections to Wyoming's Basque community, the lucrative coal-bed methane industry, and the personal life of the previous sheriff. Lucian Connally, lead to a complex web of half-truths and assumed alliances. Aided by his friend, Henry Standing Bear (the Bear), Deputy Victoria (Vic) Moretti and newcomer Santiago (Sancho) Saizarbitoria, Sheriff Longmire must connect events of the past to the present to find the killer.

The Journey from War by Diane Moody is the fourth book in her War Series. In the spring of 1957, Jacob Versteeg graduated from high school at the top of his class. Quite an accomplishment for a guy who spent his young childhood in a German concentration camp. When the war ended, he was adopted by Huub Versteeg, a kind, fellow POW at Bergen-Belsen who had taken him under his wing. For ten years, Jacob grew up in Chicago surrounded by the love of his new family. Jacob always wondered why his German parents abandoned him. After his first year at Wheaton College, Jacob joins a summer study course in West Germany. There, he realizes he must gather his courage to overcome his past if he's ever to complete his long journey from war. (The Library has Books 1-4 of the War Series.)

The following books were anonymously donated to the Library. Lady in Waiting: My Extraordinary Life in the Shadow of the Crown by Anne Glenconner who spent her life as a friend of the Royal family. She served as a Maid of Honor at Queen Elizabeth II's Coronation and a Lady in Waiting to Princess Margaret until her death in 2002. The eldest child of the 5<sup>th</sup> Earl of Leicester, Anne was brought up at one of the grandest estates in England, next door to the Royal Family's country retreat, Sandringham. The Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret were her frequent playmates. Despite Lady Glenconner's status as the firstborn child, she was deemed "the greatest disappointment" as a daughter, and thus unable to inherit. She shares intimate royal stories from her time as Princess Margaret's closest confidante as well as her own battle for survival: her broken first engagement on the basis of her "mad blood"; her fifty-four-year marriage to the volatile, unfaithful Colin Tennant (Lord Glenconner) who left his fortune to his manservant; the death of two sons in adulthood; and a third son she nursed back from a horrific motorcycle accident. Through it all, Lady Glenconner carried on as a unique witness to landmark moments in royal

Shadow Garden by Alexandra Burt. After an accident, a rich doctor's wife is recuperating at a condo, set on the grounds of a lovely estate in Texas, but troubles arise when she starts asking questions. As the novel opens, Donna Pryor is trying to settle in at Shadow Garden, where her physician husband, Edward, has settled her along with a housekeeper. The truth is our marriage is over and Shadow Garden is my consolation prize," she thinks. But why is the housekeeper sometimes distant, and why won't Donna's adult daughter, Penelope, return her calls? The story goes back in time, told from the viewpoints of Donna, Edward, and Penelope. Along with being a portrait of a marriage, it is the story of parents who can't or won't admit to problems with their only child. Why do children get hurt around Penelope? When she stabbed a classmate in the arm with a fork in the school lunchroom, Donna told Edward, "She was in a mood, all those kids and the noise." Aren't they being good parents by explaining, excusing, and covering up her actions? But when something happens that should never be covered up. events spin out of control. The author creates tension, but as actions are told, retold, refuted, and analyzed, the novel becomes one long waiting

- 6). Choose lean proteins, low fat or fat free dairy.



# **TUESDAY EVENING SPEAKER SERIES RESUMES**

The Tuesday Speaker Series is back, with our own Renny Domske!

After The Gospels Comes
The ACTS OF THE APOSTLES

I am the church You are the church We are the church together.



Maybe you remember singing that little chorus when you were younger. It reaffirms what the Church is. We . . . . are the Church . . . . together.

How did the Church begin? We spent last Spring during Lent studying the 4 Gospels, the Bible books that share the words and actions of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior. We know from those 4 gospels that after three years of ministry Jesus was crucified by the Romans, at the urging of the Jewish religious leaders, and we know that on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Day Jesus rose again from the dead. The Bible tells us that Jesus spent 40 days on earth after He arose, roaming between Galilee and Jerusalem, meeting with different groups of people, especially His 12 disciples. And then He ascended to heaven right in front of their eyes. Where did that leave Jesus' disciples, family, and friends?

The **Acts of the Apostles** picks up the story, telling what happened after Jesus ascended to heaven and how the Church was formed and grew. **Acts** tells how the disciples responded to Jesus' instructions. The disciples stand with no fear as they face some of the very people who had had Jesus put to death. We read of the growth in faith of those who believed in Jesus. We learn how the disciples of Jesus were mistreated and some even killed for their faith. We read how deacons were formed to take care of those in need. We see miraculous things still being done in the name of Jesus Christ.

The **Acts of the Apostles** is the longest book of the New Testament. **Acts** tells of the growth of Peter's ministry. **Acts** tells us of the introduction of Paul to the Church. Where first Paul tried to destroy the Church, he later became its greatest planter. There was no television or radio at this time, no phones, no internet. People became followers of Christ and proponents of the Church only face to face, one to one, person to person. And yet, despite the persecution and all the inconveniences to spread the good news of the gospel, the Church became the instrument of God in the world to others.

During this Lenten Season, for 5 Tuesdays {March 5, 12, 19, April 2, and 9}, Dr. Renny Domske will be teaching us the depth of the Acts of the Apostles. We will see how we can follow in the steps of the original apostles.

We had such unique and joyous experiences last year during Lent. We had around 65 in the class at times, studying the words and actions of Jesus. Now we get to study the words and actions of His followers as they spread His story all over the world and formed the Church. Plan on being with us each Tuesday at 7:00 to learn more about God in **Acts**.
