Lent: Repentance and Grace Revisited: A Lenten Meditation

By the time you get this issue of The Messenger the season of Lent will officially be upon us. Lent was officially established by the church in the 4th century as the 40 days before Easter, the *original* the day of resurrection. Of course, every Lord's Day is a day of resurrection. Therefore, Sundays are not included in the official counting of the forty days. These forty days, as understood by the church down through out the ages, are to be a time of preparation--- heightened devotion to the Word, prayer, repentance and fasting. This to me seems healthy and necessary. Lent is a time where we seek to remove obstacles that frustrate God's sanctifying presence in our lives, whether they be sinful attitudes and thoughts, behaviors and habits, or principalities and powers. Wherever sin is present in the Christian, repentance is obligatory.

Indeed, repentance is the necessary starting point from which God renews and revitalizes his people. Repentance is God's tool for breaking up the fallow ground of a hard heart, making it alive and one of flesh. God has always used repentance as the means to break the cycle of apostasy and spiritual stagnation in order to bring renewal to his people. Repentance understood in this way then, is not seasonal; it is a way of life. Repentance is the practical means by which God breaks through and initiates the process of renewal, individually and corporately. Without real and sincere repentance God will always refuse the blessing of his manifest presence.

The life-giving dynamic of repentance is captured in the single word, metanoia. In the Greek language it means to simply "turn around." This kind of repentance involves a life-long journey of surrendering the self to God. As Jim Eliot writes, "one does not surrender a life in an instant. That which is life-long can only be surrendered in a lifetime. Maturity is the accomplishment of years, and I can only surrender to the will of God as I know what that will is." Similarly, Chuck Colson writes: "Repentance is the process by which we see ourselves, day by day, as we really are: sinful needy, dependent people. It is the essential manifestation of regeneration that set us straight in our relationship to God. Repentance is the ultimate surrender of self." So repentance is not merely soteriology (salvation), it is our sanctification (growth in Christ-likeness) as well. Repentance is the vital spiritual key that breaks the cycle of sin and rebellion and ushers in a whole new day of God's blessing and presence.

If repentance is vital and urgently needed for our church today, how then will we the family of God here at Church of the Covenant practice it? First, I would challenge you to daily, aggressively, and relentlessly seek repentance for yourself and establish it as a value in your family. Because repentance creates a "posture" in the believer that nurtures God-given humility and receptivity to God's Spirit, I ask you to seek to change the whole environment of your life wherever it is within your influence to do so. But, I say, start with yourself and your own family. So, seek repentance daily—and seek repentance many times a day!

Second, along with challenging you to a life of repentance I would just as strongly challenge you to pursue a life of grace. The story of the Bible is a story of God breaking up humanity's sinful will and then breaking through to shower his blessing upon his people. The Christian who seeks this blessing will not only pursue a life of repentance, but also one of grace. In other words, repentance can only be genuine and lasting when the sinner sees that God's mercy is available to him. Put grace in an unreachable realm and you simply deepen the convicted sinner's despair and opposition to God. But John's Gospel banners forth the absolute finished character of Jesus' work (John 4:34; 17:4, 19:30). There is enough love, and more accessible to any sinner who wants it. One drop of Jesus' blood will, as it were, atone for the worst of humanity's sins. How then can we fail to respond when we are assured that cleansing love flows in superabundance from Calvary?

In conclusion, Lent is upon us. There is no better time to get prepared. Prepare yourself by vigorously pursuing a life of repentance and a life of grace. After all, what other life is there but a life steeped in the gospel of Jesus Christ? This, indeed, is life of superabundance!

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THE CARNAHAN LIBRARY

Dedicated on 11/1/09 to the memory of Thomas Dorrington Carnahan II, Thomas Dorrington Carnahan III, George Kirk Carnahan and to the glory of God.

The Carnahan Library is in Room 308, the first room on the right as you enter the third-floor hallway from the elevator. The card catalog will help you to locate a book by author, title, or subject. The Library Committee thanks the donors of the Library books.

We would like to thank **Barb Driscoll Knight**, who donated two books by Kate Quinn, The Huntress and The Diamond Eve, in honor of and generations from the Deep South to California and from the 1950s her sister, Meg Driscoll. The donor information was omitted in the January-February Newsletter.

From the Ashes: Berlin Fractured, Book 1 by Marion Kummerow was donated by Barb Knight. Inspired by true historical events after World War II. Marlene has no love lost for the Soviet occupying forces, who turn out to be as cruel as the Nazis were. Living in constant fear of the Russian soldiers, she works in a hospital to make ends meet, where she meets Werner, a cold-hearted career politician. Werner, a German émigré to Moscow, returns to his hometown of Berlin with the highest hopes for a better future. Sent by the Communist Party, he's soon caught in a moral conflict between loyalty to the party and his conscience. When Marlene criticizes the communist regime, she becomes the target of powerful men. Werner wishes to protect her, but will he be able to shed decades of indoctrination, and will he be willing to put his own future at risk?

The following four novels were donated by Helen Haines.

Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus was given in memory of Harriett Johnson. Chemist Elizabeth is not your average woman. In fact, Elizabeth Zott would be the first to point out that there is no such thing as an average woman. But it's the early 1960s and her all-male team at Hastings Research Institute takes a very unscientific view of -nominated grudge holder falls in love with the brilliant Elizabeth. Like Owen's 16-year-old daughter, Bailey. As phone calls to Owen go science, though, life is unpredictable. Which is why a few years later Elizabeth finds herself not only a single mother but also the reluctant star of America's most beloved cooking show, Supper at Six. Her unusual approach to cooking ("combine one tablespoon acetic acid with a pinch of sodium chloride") proves revolutionary. As it turns out, The Boys from Biloxi by James Grisham. For the past 100 years, Elizabeth isn't just teaching women to cook, she's daring them to change the status quo. Lessons in Chemistry is laugh-out-loud funny, shrewdly observant, studded with a dazzling cast of supporting charac-

The Book Woman's Daughter by Kim Michele Richardson was donated in memory of Harriet Johnson. As the daughter of the famed, blue-skinned Troublesome Creek pack horse librarian, Honey Lovett and her family have been hiding from the law all her life. When her mother and father are imprisoned, Honey realizes that she must fight to followed in his father's footsteps. Hugh preferred the nightlife and stay free or risk being sent away for good. Honey picks up her mother's old Pack Horse Library route and delivers books to the remote hollers of Appalachia. If Honey wants to bring freedom books to the families who need it most, she's going to have to fight for her place and eventually learn that the extraordinary women of the hollers can make a difference. (The library also has "The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek" - precedes "The Book Woman's Daughter.") The Girl with the Louding Voice by Abi Dare. Adunni is a fourteenyear-old girl who knows what she wants: an education. As the only daughter of a broke father, she is removed from school and sold as a third wife to an old man. When unspeakable tragedy swiftly strikes in her new home, she is secretly sold as a servant to a household in the wealthy enclaves of Lagos, where no one will talk about the strange disappearance of Rebecca. No one but Adunni...she has been told all her life that she is nothing, but Adunni won't be silenced.

The Vanishing Half by Brit Bennett weaves together multiple strands to the 1990s. The identical twin Vignes sisters grew up together in a small southern black community and ran away at age sixteen. Many years later, one sister lives with her black daughter in the same southern town she once tried to escape. Across the country, the other sister secretly passes for white, and her white husband knows nothing of her past. Although separated by many miles and many lies, the fates of the twins remain intertwined. What will happen when their own daughters' storylines intersect?

The following four books were anonymously donated.

The Midnight Library by Matt Haig. What would you do if you could fix your "regrets" and choose another direction for your life? Up until now, Nora Seed's life has been full of misery and regret. But between life and death in Nora's life, there is a library. When she finds herself in the Midnight Library, she has a chance to make things right. The books enable Nora to live as if she had done things differently. Each book contains a different life that affects her life story and everyone around her. But things aren't always what she imagined they would be. Before time runs out, she must answer the ultimate question: What is

The Last Thing He Told Me by Laura Dave. Before Owen Michaels disappears, he manages to smuggle a note to his beloved wife of one equality. Except for one: Calvin Evans, the lonely, brilliant Nobel Prize year, Hannah: "Protect her." Hannah knows to whom the note refers – unanswered, as the FBI arrests Owen's boss, and as a US Marshall shows up, Hannah realizes that her husband isn't who he said he was. And that Bailey may hold the key to figuring out Owen's true identity - and why he really disappeared.

Biloxi was known for its beaches, resorts, and seafood industry. Biloxi also had a darker side and was notorious for gambling, prostitution, bootleg liquor, drugs, and contract killings. Keith Rudy and Hugh Malco grew up in Biloxi in the 1960s and were childhood friends as well as Little League all-stars. But as teenagers, their lives went in different directions. Keith's father became a legendary prosecutor, determined to "clean up the Coast." Hugh's father became the "Boss" of Biloxi's criminal underground. Keith went to law school and worked in his father's clubs. The two families were headed for a showdown, one that would ultimately happen in a courtroom. (The Library has other novels by this author.)

Always a Guest by Barbara Brown Taylor. From beloved writer and renowned preacher Barbara Taylor Brown comes a new collection of stories and sermons of faith, grace, and hope. Taylor finds that when you are the invited guest speaking of faith to people you don't know, one must seek common ground: exploring the central human experience. Full of Taylor's astute observations on the Spirit and the state of the world along with her gentle wit, this collection will inspire Taylor's fans and preachers alike as she explores faith in all its beauty and complexity. (The Library has other books by this author.)

Our cell phones are seldom far from where we are at any given moment. They can be

a source of important medical information if you become unresponsive, are in an accident and cannot speak, or in an otherwise medical emergency. For instance, on an Apple iPhone, there is an app already installed on your phone called Health. You can open the app and enter your medical information (any medical conditions, medications, allergies, etc) and emergency contacts. Your medical ID can be viewed by emergency personnel even when your phone is locked by tapping Emergency then Medical ID. If you call 911, the iPhone can share your Medical ID. An important note, Apple cannot read your Medical ID information. Please read the privacy information on your iPhone for more information. Any questions contact me at 724-263-7911.
