#### Dear Church of the Covenant,

You are probably familiar with the Waodani people, an indigenous tribe in Amazonian Ecuador, where Jim Elliott and four missionary friends were speared to death. It's a heroic account that for generations spurred on the modern missions movement. The Waodani were once called the "Adani." It was a pejorative phrase that wasn't very complimentary towards them. When Americans looked at the Waodani, they seemed primitive and saw themselves as superior. After the tribe converted to Christianity, churches were constantly sending missions trips. During these trips, Americans would often paint buildings all over the Waodani territory. The Waodani would look at them and ask, "Do the white people think we don't know how to paint? Why do they come and do these simple things for us that we can totally do for ourselves?"

Several years ago, a film was made of the Waodani and a group of North Americans who had been brought down to live with them. The best part of the film is that you can read the translation of the Waodani speaking to each other. As the Waodani are trying to show the Americans how to shoot monkeys with a blow gun, the Waodani say things like, "these people are the most incompetent people we have ever met. They would not make it three days out here. How do they even live?" When they try to introduce the Americans to climbing trees, the Americans completely fail while the Waodani go right up the tree. At one point one of the Waodani says, "even if they shoot the monkey, they can't go up and eat it."

The Americans saw the Waodani as inferior and the Waodani saw the Americans as incompetent. The story illustrates a truth about human nature. We are innately insecure and the way we often try to recapture a sense of value, dignity and worth is to compare ourselves to other people. We do it in all sorts of ways. We do it with our intellect, our appearance, our wealth, our politics, our nationality. We can even use our faith to feel superior.

The Bible has a great illustration of this. In the gospel of Luke 18: 9-14, a religious leader goes up to the temple to pray. You would expect that prayer would be the ultimate expression of humility, right? You're standing before God bringing all your neediness to Him. But the Bible tells us that this religious man goes into the temple and he sees a tax collector. Tax collectors were the most hated people of the community. They were thieves. So, the religious man says, "God, I thank you that you have not made me like him." This is the way it goes for us. God gives us gifts. We look down our nose at other

This is who we are. And it will take the deepest work of God's grace to change us. Paul teaches us in the book of Galatians that the gospel has the power to defeat human division, disregard, arrogance, and hatred. The gospel of Jesus Christ teaches us to find our primary identity as a beloved child of God, rather than in your nationality, your geography, your education level, your wealth, or any number of other ways we divide ourselves. Your primary identity is that you are a part of God's new humanity. You're part of his family. You are his beloved child. That's your primary identity. That's the source of your worth. You belong to Jesus. God loves you.

The Long Way Home by Louise Penny was donated by Crystal Domske in memory of the late Kathy Teagarden. Happily retired in the village of Three Pines, Armand Gamache, former Chief Inspector with the Sûreté du Québec has found a peace he'd only imagined possible. On warm summer mornings he sits on a bench holding a small book, The Balm in Gilead. While Gamache doesn't talk about his wounds and his balm, Clara tells him about hers. Peter, her artist husband, has failed to show up on the first anniversary of their separation. She wants Gamache's help to find him. Having finally found sanctuary, Gamache feels a near revulsion at the thought of leaving Three Pines. Together with his former second in command, Jean-Guy Beauvoir, and Myrna Landers, they journey deeper into Quebec and deeper into the soul of Peter Morrow. A man so desperate to recapture his fame as an artist, he would sell that soul, and may have done so. (The Library has other books by this author in this excellent Inspector Gamache series.)

#### The following four books were donated by Susan Kepler.

H is for Homicide by Sue Grafton, who was an American author of detective novels. She is best known as the author of the "alphabet series" (starting with "A" is for Alibi) featuring private investigator Kinsey Millhone in the fictional city of Santa Teresa, California. In H is for Homicide, Kinsey can't believe it when her good friend and colleague Parnell Perkins is found murdered in the parking lot behind California Fidelity Insurance. He didn't have any enemies. The only clue is one of Parnell's files on a Bibianna Diaz, who appears to have made a lucrative career out of scamming insurance companies with phony claims. Taking an alias, Kinsey goes undercover to befriend Bibianna, hoping to catch the con artist at her own game. But Bibianna's very jealous, very dangerous ex-fiancé Raymond Maldonado catches up with them; and he is the one behind Bibianna's and countless other phony insurance claims. Kinsey will have to be very careful in trying to nab Raymond if he indeed was also responsible for Parnell's death. (You can enjoy the "alphabet series" without reading the books in order.)

<u>S is for Silence</u> by Sue Grafton. Cases don't get much colder than that of Violet Sullivan, who disappeared from her rural California town in 1953, leaving behind an abusive husband and a seven-year-old named Daisy. But PI Kinsey Millhone has promised Daisy that she'll try her best to locate Violet, dead or alive. Kinsey tries to pick up a trail by speaking to those who remember Violet, and perhaps were more involved in her life than they let on. But the trail could lead Kinsey somewhere very dangerous. Although the case may have gone cold, some people's feelings about Violet Sullivan still run as hot as ever.

<u>T is for Trespass</u> by Sue Grafton is her most direct confrontation with the forces of evil. Beginning slowly with the day-to-day life of a private eye, Grafton suddenly shifts from the voice of Kinsey Millhone to that of Solan Rojas, introducing readers to a chilling sociopath. Rojas is not her birth name. It is an identity she cunningly stole, an identity that gives her access to private caregiving jobs. The true horror of this novel builds with excruciating tension as the reader foresees the awfulness that lies ahead. The wrenching suspense lies in whether Kinsey Millhone will realize what is happening in time to intervene

<u>Hornet's Nest</u> by Patricia Cornwell reveals the heart and soul of a metropolitan police department. Deputy Chief Virginia West likes and respects her boss, Police Chief Judy Hammer. With an increasing number of visiting businessmen being murdered in her city by a maniac with a penchant for painting his victims bright orange, she finds it hard to accept Hammer's edict that a rookie reporter should ride on patrol with her to better relations with their citizens. Her worst fears are confirmed when the reporter, Andy Brazil, presses the button to activate the boot-release rather than the siren on their first outing. He's not the only blight on her life right now: her cat's angst, her opposite number in the uniformed division is behaving like a jerk, the radio dispatcher is determined to trip her up, the D.A. is in the middle of a hot battle with the trial schedule - and orange-colored corpses keep turning up on her beat.

**Dear Edward** by Ann Napolitano was donated by **Helen Haines.** One summer morning, twelve-year-old Edward Adler, his beloved older brother, his parents, and 183 other passengers boarded a flight in Newark headed for Los Angeles. Halfway across the country, the plane crashes. Edward is the sole survivor. Edward's story captures the attention of a nation, but he struggles to find a place in the world without his family. He continues to feel that a part of himself has been left in the sky, forever tied to the plane and his fellow passengers. But then he makes an unexpected discovery – one that will lead him to the answers to some of life's most profound questions. *Dear Edward* is a coming-of-age story that illustrates all the ways a broken heart learns to love again.

#### The following two books were donated by Debi Nicolella.

Hearts of Fire by The Voice of the Martyrs. "If you are a Christian, then there is no place for you in this city – you will die here alone." Tara's father's parting words brought only one thought to the mind of the sixteen-year-old girl – she must escape for her life. Beaten to the brink of death, Tara – the daughter of a prominent Pakistani Muslim – was locked in her room as a prisoner without food or medical attention. All because she was caught with a Bible. Tara's story is not unique among these eight courageous women in Hearts of Fire. From the young Vietnamese girl who turns down freedom to evangelize the people of her Communist homeland, to the Australian missionary who spreads the message of forgiveness and healing across India after her husband and sons are burned alive by village zealots, these eight women have overcome adversity to emerge as leaders and ministers to the underground church around the world. This book tells true stories of eight courageous women, heroines of the faith, who are representative of countless women facing similar situations around the world.

The Secret Supper by Javier Sierra is an historical thriller with a unique vision of both Leonardo de Vinci's genius and his masterpiece - which you will never look at in the same way again. Milan, 1497: Leonardo is completing The Last Supper. Pope Alexander VI is determined to execute him after realizing that the painting contains clues to a baffling and blasphemous message that he is driven to decode. The story is told in the words of Agostino Leyre, as mysterious letters come in to Rome. He is a chief Inquisitor, so he decides to investigate who had sent these mysterious letters, hinting at heresy. He goes to Santa Maria delle Grazie, where he meets various monks, priests and nuns. But while he is there, various suspicious deaths and rumors take him into a search for truth - the meaning of The Last Supper. Intrigued, he finds yet another mystery - a blue leather-bound book, portrayed in Tarot cards left by the killer of several pilgrims, known as the Soothsayer.
