Dear Congregation of God.

As a pastor, one of the spiritual disciplines that I have embraced over the past few years is relearning the "language of lament." That is, coming alongside people who have lost so much recently amidst this pandemic. People who are grieving speak a particular language, "I just wish we could go back to the old ways of life." Or even, "I wonder if we'll ever go back?" Grieving to most means the loss of something that they once held dear. It is apparent to me that over the next month we are entering into one of those seasons where we will be grieving the loss of staff and certain services within our church.

First, we grieve the loss of Pastor Scott and his ministry within our church. Once again, the leadership wisely and prayerfully made this difficult decision for the financial well-being of the church. Nonetheless, it will be painful for us and for Scott and his family to say farewell on November 20th. And so we grieve.

Second, we made the decision to indefinitely suspend the 8:00am worship service beginning on November 27th. Once again, with the financial crisis we face, as well as our reduced number of worship attenders coming out of the pandemic, it comes down to a question of resources— are we wisely using our resources for the larger mission of the church? Here again, Session made the difficult decision, and so we grieve with those who have made that service (and its 8:30 predecessor) "their service" for many years.

Last and most recently, the Membership and Fellowship committee made the difficult decision to discontinue our Sunday radio broadcast on WJPA on November 27th. As you know, the Finance Committee charged all committees to reduce their 2023 budget by 10%. The Membership and Fellowship Committee felt this change was the most effective way to reduce their budget. And while we are uncertain just how many continue to tune in to this broadcast, we are certain there are other, more cost-efficient methods of broadcasting and streaming the weekly sermon. That said, this will be difficult news to hear from those who continue to tune in via the radio broadcast.

With all that said, you can see why I say we are most certainly entering into a season of lament. My simple charge to you, and to me, is that we all come alongside those who are most affected by these most difficult decisions. Change is hard. Grief is natural. But let us all listen to, pray, and show love and compassion to one another as we press forward with unwavering faith into the future that God has planned for us. Trust me, there are good days ahead!

UPDATE FROM THE ENDOWMENT COMMITTEE

On October 4, the Endowment Committee performed one of its most important regular functions. The Committee made its annual distributions from endowment income to the budget of the Church. This year distributions to church budgets totaled over \$97,800 to support categories required by restrictions in the various endowed funds. These restrictions fall into eight (8) broad areas listed below alongside the amount distributed to each in 2022.

THE CARNAHAN LIBRARY

Dedicated on 11/1/09 to the memory of Thomas Dorrington Carnahan II, Thomas Dorrington Carnahan III, George Kirk Carnahan and to the glory of God.

The following books were donated to the library. The Library Committee thanks the donors. All have been cataloged and are ready to be checked out. The library is in Room 308, the first room on the right as you enter the third floor hallway from the elevator. The card catalog will help you to locate a book by author, title or subject.

The following two books were donated by Linda Pitner.

Ask Again, Yes by Mary Beth Keane. Francis Gleeson and Brian Stanhope, rookie cops in the NYPD, live next door to each other outside the city. What happens behind closed doors in both houses—the loneliness of Francis's wife, Kena, and the instability of Brian's wife, Anne, sets the stage for the explosive events to come. This story is an exploration of the lifelong friendship and love that blossoms between Kate Gleeson and Peter Stanhope, born six months apart. One shocking night their loyalties are divided, and their bond will be tested many times over the next 40 years. This novel reveals the way childhood memories change when viewed from the distance of adulthood—villains lose their menace and those who appeared innocent seem less so.

<u>The Turn of the Key</u> by Ruth Ware. A young woman accepts a live-in nanny's job in Scotland that seems too good to be true—a generous salary, a beautiful home, and a picture-perfect family. What she doesn't know is that she is walking into a nightmare—one that will eventually find her in prison awaiting trial for murder. The author is described as the Agatha Christie of our time. (The library has more books by Ruth Ware.)

The following two books were donated by the Rev. Kay Balderose *Eerdman's Handbook to Christianity in America* by Mark A. Noll provides a history of the US Christian church with biographical information on church leaders, the different organized churches, and popular Christian movements from colonial times up through the 1970's. Excellent photographs and artwork accompany every major topic.

Total Truth: Liberating Christianity from its Cultural Captivity by Nancy Pearcey offers a razor-sharp analysis of the public/private split, explaining how it hamstrings our efforts at both personal and cultural renewal. The book reflects a division in the concept of truth itself, which functions as a gatekeeper, ruling Christian principles out of bounds in the public arena. How can we unify our fragmented lives and recover spiritual power? With examples from the lives of real people, past and present, Pearcey teaches readers how to liberate Christianity from its cultural captivity. She walks readers through practical, hands-on steps for crafting a full-orbed Christian worldview. Finally, she makes a passionate case that Christianity is not just religious truth, but truth about total reality. It is total truth.

The following books were donated anonymously.

Runaway by Peter May. In 1965 Glasgow, Jack Mackay dares not imagine a life of predictability and routine. The headstrong 17-year-old has one thing on his mind – London – and successfully convinces his four friends and fellow band mates to join him in abandoning their homes to pursue a goal of musical stardom. In 2015 Glasgow, 67-year-old Jack Mackay is haunted by memories that he has run from all his life. In 2015 London, what started with five teenagers five decades before will now be finished.

The Canadians by Andrew H. Malcolm. The second-largest country by area in the world, Canada was created by another foreign power for reasons of its own that had little to do with Canadian desires and nothing to do with natural geographical boundaries. Beset by political handicaps, a harsh climate, and a divisive geography, a disparate Canada set out to build a modern, independent country in the economic, military, and cultural shadow of the world's two superpowers, the US and the Soviet Union. The fact that it accomplished this task without a military revolution, civil war or without the overthrow of any government denotes an impressive amount of skill and grace. But it was also accomplished without much attention even within Canada.

The Striker: An Isaac Bell Adventure by Clive Cussler. It is 1902, and a bright, inexperienced young man named Isaac Bell, only two years out of his apprenticeship at the Van Dorn Detective agency, has an urgent message for his boss. Hired to hunt for radical unionist saboteurs in the coal mines, he is witness to a terrible accident that makes him think something else is going on...that provocateurs are at work and bigger stakes are in play. Little does he know how big they are. Given exactly one week to prove his case, Bell quickly finds himself pitted against two of the most ruthless opponents he has ever known—men of staggering ambition and cold-bloodedness who are not about to let some wet-behind-the-ears detective stand in their way.

The Racketeer by John Grisham. In the history of the US, only four active federal judges have been murdered. Judge Raymond Fawcett has just become number five. His body is found in his remote lakeside cabin. There is no sign of forced entry or struggle. Just two dead bodies: Judge Fawcett and his secretary, and one large, state-of-the-art, extremely secure safe, opened and emptied. One man, a former attorney, knows who killed Judge Fawcett and why. But that man, Malcolm Bannister, is currently residing in the Federal Prison Camp near Frostburg, Maryland. Though serving time, Malcolm has an ace up his sleeve. He has information the FBI would love to know and Malcolm would love to tell them. But everything has a price –and the man known as the Racketeer wasn't born yesterday. (The library has other books by John Grisham.)

No Place I'd Rather Be by Cathy Lamb. Two years ago, Olivia Martindale left behind her Montana hometown and her husband, Jace, certain it was the best decision for both of them. Back temporarily to protect her almost-adopted daughters from their biological mother, she discovers an old, handwritten cookbook in the attic, the recipes are written in different hands and in different languages. Hoping the recipes will offer a window into her grandmother's closely guarded past, Olivia decides to make each dish and records her attempts. The result, like much of her life to date, involves a parade of near disasters and chaotic appearances by family members. The project is messy, real and an unintended hit.

PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN NEWS BIRTHDAY AND THANK OFFERINGS

Presbyterian Women (PW) have been heeding the call to give thanks to God, and to do good to one another and to all since they started organizing as aid societies in the 1700s. Today, the PW continues the tradition of generosity through Birthday and Thank Offering fund raising drives.

The Thank Offering began in 1888, when Eliza Clokely of Springfield, Ohio urged each woman to give one dollar over and above her usual offering. In 1998, the newly-formed Presbyterian Women adopted the Thank Offering as one of two grant-giving programs of the PW National Organization. This year, the group has awarded grants to eight national and two international causes.

Included in those chosen to receive grants are Presbytery of Miami Valley. A \$13,000 grant will provide supplies for building and rehabilitating homes. Due to the projects' financial structure, these funds will continue into perpetuity. The international grant is for Haiti, of the South Atlantic Presbytery of Tampa Bay, in the amount of \$47,887. This project will help prevent and address the root causes of severe malnutrition for rural, exceptionally poor families in Mombin Crochu.




