TEEN EXTREME 2022

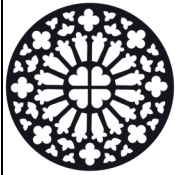

Dear Church of the Covenant,

There was an interesting article in the New York Times a few years ago. The title was “The Enduring Hunt for Personal Value.” Here’s the theme sentence: “Our shared core hunger is for value. We desperately want to matter and to feel a sense of worthiness.” So, why is the hunt for value a desperate and enduring thing? If you look across cultures and time, you find there is hunger for something. It gets packaged differently: glory on the battlefield, or to save face, or moral scrupulousness, or in our culture, self-esteem. But it’s there, everywhere you look. It’s a hunger for approval and acceptance.

Why is this? Genesis 1 tells us. In the beginning, when we were absolutely certain of God’s approval, we lived naked and unashamed. What that means is that we didn’t need to spin or control what others thought of us. We didn’t need to hide who we really are. When we lost the certainty of God’s approval, we developed a problem. We developed an acceptance and assurance hunger, a self-esteem hunger that never seems to be satisfied.

In my life, and in your life, there is always the question before us: what are you looking for? Or, another way to put it: what is it that you most fundamentally love? What are the things you most fundamentally hope in? You have to set your heart on something as your ultimate hope, the thing you are looking for to make yourself happy? Have you ever found yourself thinking, “If I just have that? If I was more beautiful? If I had that job? If I had that much money? When I get married to that love partner, then I’ll be complete.” So, what’s our hope?

Jesus said in John’s gospel, “Moses gave you bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. I am the Bread of Life. You people are looking for food that spoils.” In those days only the very wealthy ate meat. In ancient times bread kept you alive. Bread is also a metaphor for spiritual fulfillment, spiritual satisfaction and spiritual contentment. God offers that. Then Jesus says all of us are seeking satisfaction and contentment in things that will spoil or disappoint. Maybe not right away. Food that spoils doesn’t spoil right away. Food that spoils is Jesus’ way of saying we all have spiritual hunger. And we look for it in the wrong places.

God offers you the Bread of Life. Do you want contentment and fulfillment? A life that is marked by consistent, relentless joy? It’s not in your bank account, your spouse, your family. If Jesus really is the Creator-King-Lord even the best this life has to offer cannot give the significance, security and affirmation that you so crave. Your spouse, your children, your career cannot die for your sins. Our souls simply cannot be filled up by anything else.

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What we need, desperately need, is a living, breathing, vibrant relationship with our Lord and Savior: the meaning and reason for our existing.

PARISH NURSE CORNER

As children return to school later this month, the weight of children’s school backpacks is a concern of healthcare professionals. Backpacks that are too heavy can cause back, neck and shoulder pain in still-growing children. Here are some tips to lighten the load:

- 1). choose the appropriate size-no wider than the torso and no more that 4 inches below the waist.
 - 2). padded shoulder and back straps
 - 3). waist and chest straps to evenly distribute the weight.
 - 4). multiple compartments to help position the weight more effectively.
