I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the fellowship of sharing in his suffering, becoming like him in his death, and so, somehow, to attain to the resurrection from the dead. Philippians 3:10,11

Dear People of the Resurrection,

It's almost Easter and we will soon join Christians all over the world in a great shout, "He is risen. He is risen indeed!" Powerful hymns of the church along with contemporary songs of joy will join one another in a thousand different languages to proclaim the central truth of the Christian faith, "On the third day, he rose from the dead..." Sermons join this chorus explaining, proclaiming, declaring, and applying the reality of the resurrection to millions of congregations. Preachers like me will come at the ancient texts from a variety of directions. And out of the blizzard of words we will attempt to speak it in fresh, relevant ways that touch lives and transform hearts.

Common to all, of course, is the astounding and transforming truth, God raised Jesus from the dead and nothing will ever be the same again. It can't be the same. The risen Christ enters the lives of all who trust in him and through his men and women, his church, he invades the world. But behind our witness stands another reality. This truth is part of the apostle's witness from beginning to end. "We have seen him," the people cried with joy. Then their worlds turned upside down.

We see the risen Christ too. Not like they did, of course. But we see him in Scripture. We behold him with eyes of faith. And once-in-a-while, thank God, we see the Risen One in each other as well. I know. You dear people of Church of the Covenant have been the Word made flesh for Karen and I over the past three months. Simple acts of love, kindness and hospitality have been, in fact, the touch of God for us. And I know that by a miracle beyond my understanding, I have been God's touch for many of you. We shouldn't be surprised. After all, we live and breathe in a community of faith energized by the presence of the Risen One who promises to be with always.

I believe if our eyes were wide open we would see him much more often. And the church would become what G.K. Chesterton once described it, "A winged thunderbolt of enthusiasm."

He is risen indeed. Do you see Him?


PRESCHOOL NEWS

The Believer's Identity in Christ In the gospel of John Jesus contrasts His purpose with that of humanity's adversary when He states, 10 The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly. John 10:10(ESV). Our adversary is not creative but he is consistent, incessantly whispering lies to us about God and ourselves that take root in our minds and distort our perception of reality stealing, killing, and destroying all that is good in us and for us. For followers of Jesus, the realization of the abundant life Jesus promises here and now is foundationally rooted in becoming increasingly aware of the specific lies that masquerade as truth and replacing them with the truths of who God really is and who we are as uniquely created in His image. In this class you will learn how to identify the lies that the enemy uses to keep you held captive, destroy them, and replace them with the biblical truths that will set you free (John 8:32) to know life as Jesus intends for you

Bio: If you were to ask those closest to Dr. Mark Simpson what makes him tick, they would say that his heart beats to inspire a legacy of knowing and imitating Christ. Whether it is in his marriage to Holly (29 years), his fathering of Mackenzie (22) and Ethan (16) or in his pastoral ministry (30+ years), this is the common thread that gets him up in the morning and keeps him talking late into the night. Mark currently serves as Associate Pastor at Church United in Staunton, VA and Adjunct Instructor at Liberty University. PARISH NURSE CORNER

April is Parkinson's Disease Awareness Month. Raising public awareness about Parkinson's is very important. It is thought to affect over 1 million people in the United States. It is a neurodegenerative condition and symptoms can vary widely among people in terms of type and severity. Symptoms of Parkinson's Disease include: difficulties in balance, swallowing, chewing and speaking; tremor; slowness; constipation; sleep disruption; anxiety and issues with cognition. The cause is unknown and there are no known successful treatments to delay or stop progression. The symptoms are often mistaken for other conditions. Please talk with your PCP if you notice a tremor which is often the first noticeable sign of Parkinson's; a referral to a neurologist will be the first step to a diagnosis. Any questions?
